Lent to Easter 2015

It has been a delight to meet many of you in my first couple of weeks here in the parish. I was made a deacon on 7th February, and began my ministry as Assistant Curate at St. Stephen's and St. Mary's the following morning.

I live in Ringwood East with my two sons: Hamish (aged 17) and Josh (aged 15). We have worshipped for the past six years at St. Paul's, Canterbury, where I was the Family and Youth Minister.

I have been a Christian since I had a conversion experience at the age of 15. I was confirmed at 16, prior to leaving home at 17 to join the Navy. I studied a Bachelor of Science (Oceanography and Chemistry) at the Australian Defence Force Academy in Canberra, prior to commencing my training as an Officer of the Watch at sea. I stayed in that role, serving primarily in HMA Ships Swan and Tobruk, for four years. Once I left the Navy, my then -husband, an Army officer, and I lived for a year in each Sydney and Darwin, prior to moving to Melbourne.

Among other things, I am a Cub Scout Leader; I enjoy camping, hiking and geocaching (Google it!); I relax by reading, listening to music, and watching films. My extended family live close by, and I regularly visit with them and my good friends.

I thoroughly enjoyed my time in the Navy, and have been ordained with a view to becoming a Naval Chaplain. I commenced my theological studies at the United Faculty of Theology (Trinity College)

in 2003, and completed a Master of Divinity and Diploma of Theology part-time over the ensuing 11 years. I now need to spend two or three years in this parish, learning all the things that a deacon/priest needs to know, prior to being accepted as a Chaplain.

I have experienced such a warm welcome by the people of St. Stephen's and St. Mary's that I know it will be a joy to minister alongside you all. Given that we are now in the season of Lent, I thought I would share with you some points from the sermon I preached on Ash Wednesday...

There is a great website I visit now and then called "Busted Halo" (www.bustedhalo.com). It is an online magazine for spiritual seekers. They have some great Lenten resources, including short videos to explain Ash Wednesday and Lent, and a Lent calendar – like an Advent calendar! – with a challenge each day to fast, pray and give.

The three Lenten disciplines are fasting, praying and almsgiving. Fasting reminds us of our dependence on God, and leads us to repentance and humility. Praying seeks to fill the holy longing that is part of being human, and leads to renewal. Giving reminds us that what we have is not just for us to enjoy, but to share with others, and for the service of others, and thus builds community.

In the gospel reading for Ash Wednesday (Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21), Jesus speaks about each of these practices. Each of them is designed

to bring us closer to God and to God's people, but each can also become a means by which we see ourselves as better than others. Regular periods of stillness and listening will give God a chance to point out to us such issues.

As we commence our Lenten journey towards the cross and the resurrection of Christ, we are to remember that what we see and experience here is not the ultimate reality. We are destined for eternal life with God. That is why we fast and pray and give away our possessions: to make us more aware of the reality towards which Jesus journeyed, and towards which we are called.

The agony and ecstasy of this world should not hold us in thrall, because they are but shadows, dim reflections of the glory that awaits us on the other side of that doorway called death, the glory in which our beloved Bishop Barbara Darling now worships her God. We, too, will be called that way, at our own appointed, if unknown time. Let us store up treasures and rewards there, with our Father who sees in secret. May we hold onto this vision as we take up our Lenten disciplines and journey with Christ towards the cross.

Lent the Amber Light

Have you ever found yourself driving along in the traffic somewhat preoccupied and on autopilot when suddenly an amber light appears jarring you to awareness. An amber light gets our attention telling us something is required of us. What we are supposed to do is slow down and prepare to stop for the coming red light. Then it is wise to stay in a state of alert, waiting.

Lent is like an Amber light. It grabs our attention to prepare for a significant event ahead as we are racing through life. But Lent is not just a pointer to Easter ahead. It is a significant event in itself inviting us to stay in a place of awareness and alertness to self and God.

In the traffic when an amber light appears we could be tempted to slam our foot flat to the floor and go racing triumphantly through it while maybe feeling a bit of both elation and guilt. We could be tempted to do this with Lent and just forge through to Easter (although I am sure nobody in OUR parish is tempted in these ways!).

What if we find ourselves too geared up to slow down into Lent? Don't get worried or guilty or give up before beginning. There are no Lent Cops spying on us. Fortunately with forty days ahead we will probably be graced with enough amber lights to call us to attention. And just what are we paying attention to anyway in our alert waiting? The ancient practices associated with the Lenten season are invitations to lead us into taking stock of how we stand in relation to God and our neighbour.

Vale - The Right Reverend Barbara Brinsley Darling

The Right Reverend Barbara Darling died in hospital after suffering a stroke on Saturday 7 February. Family and friends were with her when she died.

Bishop Barbara was made deacon in the church of God in 1986, the first occasion when women were ordained in the Anglican Church of Australia. In 1992 she was ordained to the priesthood, the group being the first of women priests in the Diocese of Melbourne.

Her ministry before ordination had been extensive. Following a period as a teacher in NSW she moved to Melbourne in 1975 where she took on various roles at Ridley College – student, tutor, lecturer and librarian over the years until 1989. At the same time she held a laywoman's role in the Parish of Heidelberg from 1981-1986. From 1989 – 1992 the then Reverend Barbara Darling was the Minister in Charge at the Parish



of Ascot Vale, becoming the Incumbent in 1992 when she was ordained priest. In 1995 she moved to AII Souls' Sandringham as Incumbent, where she served for ten years. In 2005 she went to St James' Dandenong as the Incumbent, where she ministered until 2008.

On 31 May 2008 Barbara Brinsley Darling was consecrated in St Paul's Cathedral Melbourne as Bishop in the Church of God, the first woman Bishop for Melbourne. As an Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Melbourne she first headed up the Department of Diocesan Services and then became Bishop of the Eastern Region of Melbourne, having Episcopal oversight of around 67 Other ministries have parishes. included being a Canon of St Paul's Cathedral from 1995 and later the Senior Canon, having oversight of the

Chaplains in Anglican Schools and the Tertiary Chaplains, and being the Episcopal Overseer of Cursillo for Melbourne.

She had just reached a time of long service leave and transition to retirement.

Her sudden and untimely death has shocked and saddened all who knew her and enjoyed her loving pastoral support, friendship and encouragement, within the diocese of Melbourne, with her fellow Bishops, amongst the staff of the diocese and throughout Australian Anglicans.


The Centenary Service... The Rev'd Charles Oliver





Some Interesting Facts

The Old Church's cost was just over £300 with bricks costing £64/10/-. The original bell was £1.

A well or underground tank cost £5/10/- and was connected to a stable built just outside the door of the vestry. Later it became the haunt of "Swaggies", and when it was found they were drinking more than their share of water, and a child arrived home covered in fleas from one of the "swaggies" dogs.

The tank was filled in the mid 1930s. Most successful "Tea Meeting" to celebrate the opening saw 200 present on 28/9/1865. First Known Bishop's visit to the Church, 2 April 1891, The Right. Rev Field Flowers.

First Baptism held on 8/10/1865, the twin sons of Thomas and Hanna Williams of Mulgrave.

Sons named Thomas Henry and Henry Thomas!

In 1885 a bottle of communion wine cost 1/9d. First Harvest Festival 1899

St Stephen became a Parochial District on 1st June 1890 and Rev.J. Arthur Priestly was licensed as deacon in charge of Wellington, Waverley and Burwood. His stipend was £15 per quarter Keep aware of new additions to the programme by looking at the:

What is a Saint?

A Saint is one who has come face to face with God, and, who as a result; makes it easier for others to believe in God. It is God who makes a saint, but sainthood is mediated through a human community. A saint is not the product of solitude, but the product of God through His Church. The marks of a saint are

- * Love
- * Faith
- Holiness
- Witness
- * Service.

There are living saints and departed saints; great saints and lesser saints; well known saints; saints of the past and saints of the present; and all are members of the wondrous communities or Fellowship of the Saints. Here is a company of men and women, ordinary men and women, who have proved that the forces of pain and evil in the world can be conquered and transformed by the power of Christ. Here is a wondrous company of visible and invisible who share with us and help us on our earthly pilgrimage. Here are those in whom we can see our own weaknesses, no

matter what they are, turned to triumph. Here are those who show that it is possible to know Christ and love Him in total devotion. To their joy and their glory all are called.



The Collect for All Saints' Day states the union of all those chosen by God in the spiritual Body of Christ, the Church Militant, Expectant, Triumphant; and prays that we may follow the example of the saints, and come quickly to the joys that God has prepared for those who love Him truly.

- * Do I really want this?
- * Do I really understand what the example of the saints is?

"A saint my child, is one who keeps on trying; who has conquered and is



conquering in my strength; who has mastered self and given his life for me; who persists in believing me and my love despite all things to the contrary; who helps others to find what he has found. A saint is known by his life, his energy, his continued joy; his constructive sympathy, his hatred of deadness and slackness, his constant humble witness to my Gospel. Is this what you want, my child?"

The Gospel from St Matthew (part of the sermon on the Mount) declares the Church's mind as to the marks of saintly character, and sets out the Eightfold Rule of Blessedness given by our Lord.


From Tielhard de Chardin
