

First Reading: Acts 2.14a, 22 - 32

Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd, "Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know-23 this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. 24 But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power. 25 For David says concerning him, "I saw the Lord always before me, for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; 26 therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover, my flesh will live in hope. 27 For you will not abandon my soul to Hades, or let your Holy One experience corruption. 28 You have made known to me the ways of life; you will make me full of gladness with your presence." 29 'Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day. 30 Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn with an oath to him that he would put one of his descendants on his throne. 31 Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying, "He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh experience corruption." 32 This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses.

Gospel Reading: John 20.19 - 31

19 When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' 20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. 21 Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' 22 When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. 23 If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.' 24 But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. 25 So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.' 26 A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' 27 Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' 28 Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' 29 Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.' 30 Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. 31 But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.



From the Vicar

The Gospel reading today is one of transformation. The fear of the disciples, locked in their upper room and huddled in upon themselves, is transformed by the gift of peace which Jesus brings and his giving of the Spirit to strengthen them on their way. Well, I don't know about you, but this sounds much like us and the world at the moment. We are huddled in our homes for fear of "The sickness" as my 4 year old grandsons call Coronavirus. But, like the disciples it can be a time of growth in our faith as Jesus continues to bring his peace into our lives and continues to give us his Spirit to strengthen and transform us.

The doubt of Thomas is transformed by his encounter with the risen Lord. With this transformation, however, comes responsibility. Just as Jesus was sent into the world, so we are, as Jesus' disciples, we are also sent into the world to act as Jesus did. When Thomas is told by his companions that they have seen Jesus, he places his own conditions on faith. He will not believe unless he sees and touches Jesus. And so when Thomas is given the opportunity to touch Jesus he professes his faith, while he may have been surprised, he was alert to the nearness of Jesus. Touch goes beyond verifying physical presence. It can provide healing and comfort; it can be an act of support or compassion. Look for ways in which a simple gesture of touch can convey friendship, compassion or support this week.


Did You Know:

- The period from Easter to Pentecost is known as 'the Great Fifty Days' and is an integral part of the Lent-Easter-Pentecost cycle.
- There is an ancient tradition that Thomas preached the Gospel as far east as India and there are many South Indian congregations in India and indeed Melbourne called Mar Thoma – St. Thomas.
- The next few weeks feature readings from John's Gospel, the last of the written canonical Gospels. While the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) are read through the normal three year cycle, John is featured in particular seasons throughout the normal cycle.

Carpark Tree

It is with some sadness that the time has come (within the next four weeks) for the large tree in the carpark to be removed. The report of a professional arborist confirmed what many of us have observed in the last couple of years namely that the tree is in very poor health (loss of limbs, decaying hollows, significant dieback) which has not been helped by previous removal of the main scaffold limbs with new growth being only from epicormic buds (from just underneath the bark layer). The consequence is that further limb failure is both highly likely and immanent. Thus because of the serious safety risks posed by the latter, the Parish Council has decided to have the tree removed. As part of the removal process, the stump will also be ground out. The tree is not within a Monash Council Vegetation Protection Overlay.

We look forward to eventually replacing the tree with more suitable vegetation once social distancing restrictions allow us to work on restoring the health of the ground in the enclosure.
