



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First Reading: Jeremiah 31.1-6

At that time, says the Lord, I will be the God of all the families of Israel, and they shall be my people.2 Thus says the Lord: The people who survived the sword found grace in the wilderness; when Israel sought for rest, 3 the Lord appeared to him from far away. I have loved you with an everlasting love; therefore I have continued my faithfulness to you. 4 Again I will build you, and you shall be built, O virgin Israel! Again you shall take your tambourines, and go forth in the dance of the merrymakers. 5 Again you shall plant vineyards on the mountains of Samaria; the planters shall plant, and shall enjoy the fruit. 6 For there shall be a day when sentinels will call in the hill country of Ephraim: 'Come, let us go up to Zion, to the Lord our God.'

Second Reading: Colossians 3.1 - 4

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. 2 Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, 3 for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. 4 When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 28.1 - 10

After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. 2 And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. 3 His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. 4 For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. 5 But the angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. 6 He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. 7 Then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you

will see him." This is my message for you.' 8 So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 9 Suddenly Jesus met them and said, 'Greetings!' And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him. 10 Then Jesus said to them, 'Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me.'

From the Vicar

I thought I would tell you a little bit about the paschal candle in today's letter.

A dominant feature of our sanctuary is the paschal candle. It burns as a sign of the Risen Christ.

It entered the church's worship in medieval times, but its origins are much earlier. In the Hebrew Scriptures, fire was seen as a sign of God's presence, especially in the pillar of fire that led the Israelites in their journey to the Promised Land. Christians naturally saw the Risen Jesus as the 'New Moses', the pioneer of our salvation, leading us through the desert into new life, and thus used fire as his sign.

The symbolism is of Christ's triumph over the darkness of sin and death. Each year the paschal candle is renewed in the Easter Vigil. The church is dark, representing the tomb of the crucified Jesus. The candle is lit and carried in procession into the darkness, and the people acclaim the Risen Christ, the Light of the World. The Spirit of Jesus is not extinguished by death, and is with us now, leading us into the abundant life of God.

The paschal candle burns for the 50 days of Easter. After Pentecost it is placed beside the font as a visual reminder that in our baptism, we are crucified and resurrected with Christ. Thus it is lit for all baptisms, and all feasts where we renew our baptismal vows. It is also used during funerals, proclaiming the scripture used at the beginning of the burial liturgy: *"In our baptism we have already died and been raised with Christ."* (Romans 6.3-5)

The candle is decorated, carrying the alpha and omega, and the year - Christ is the beginning and the end of all creation, and eternally present with us in our church and lives. It has 5 brass studs representing the wounds of the cross, for the Resurrected Christ is also the Crucified One. *Cross and resurrection* belong to God's process of liberation and never be separated.

Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. Romans 6.3-5
