⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. ⁴³ Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵ they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶ Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

Gospel Reading: John 10.1-10

1 'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. 2 The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. 3 The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. 4 When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. 5 They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' 6 Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. 7 So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. 8 All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. 9 I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. 10 The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

From Your Vicar

In the Gospel of John, we do not find parables in the traditional sense. It is not a literary device which John employs, but this text is as close an approximation to a parable that we have. The contrast he draws between the shepherd who enters the fold by the gate and the thieves and bandits who seek to enter another way, is really about leadership. There are good leaders and bad leaders. If you remember in chapter 9 there is the healing story of the blind man on the Sabbath, the Pharisees attacked Jesus as a sinner for transgressing the law of Moses. In the dispute that followed, Jesus condemned the religious authorities for refusing to recognize the gift of God present in his ministry. And so, in Chapter 10, Jesus continues to criticize his opponents for their self-serving and faithless leadership, using familiar imagery of a shepherd and sheep.

The good leader of God's people must come to them through Jesus who is the gate. The thieves and bandits will only lead the people to fear and confusion where they will be scattered. And so, we see Jesus once again being the giver of life in abundance to all who know his voice and follow him as shepherd. What false voices can be heard in our world today? What message do they seek after which is different from the message of Jesus? And finally, what are the things that make it difficult to resist the false voices in our world?

Did you Know:

John's Gospel provides various images of Jesus in the form of the 'I am' sayings. There are seven of these:

- 'I am the bread of life' (Jn 6: 48)
- 'I am the light of the world' (Jn 8: 12, 9:5)
- 'I am the gate and the good shepherd' (Jn 10: 9,11)
- 'I am the resurrection and the life' (Jn 11:25)
- 'I am the way, the truth and the life' (Jn 14: 6)
- 'I am the true vine' (Jn 15:1)
- 'Before Abraham was born, I am' (Jn 8: 58)

All these sayings should be read and understood within the context of the Hebrew name of God, especially the last one listed. When Moses encountered God in the burning bush, he asks by what name God is known. God replies, 'I AM WHO I AM. Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I AM has sent me to you." John is making a very profound point about the identity of Jesus in these sayings.



Dr Dan Fleming is Group Manager – Ethics and Formation for St Vincent's Health Australia. In this role he leads ethics education and strategy and supports formation across the St Vincent's Health Australia network. Dan is also a Fellow in the Law, Health and Justice Research Centre in the Faculty of Law at the University of Technology Sydney and a Senior Lecturer in Theology and Ethics with the Sydney College of Divinity. Dan holds a PhD in moral philosophy and theology, and is the author of more than 40 publications in the areas of moral philosophy, theological ethics, moral education, religious education and theology.

Dr David Carter is a Senior Lecturer and National Health and Medical Research Council Early Career Fellow in the Faculty of Law at the University of Technology Sydney. His work focuses on the legal, regulatory and governance challenges involved in the delivery of safe, effective and sustainable healthcare services. Prior to joining UTS, David worked in a variety of management roles in hospital and health services, as well as at the Wayside Chapel in Sydney's Kings Cross. He regularly collaborates with Catholic hospitals on new and emerging issues at the intersection of law, health services and ethics. David is also a doctoral candidate at Trinity College Theological School, engaging in research towards 'A Theology of Infectious Disease', supervised by Dr Scott Kirkland.
