First Reading: Acts 2.1-21

1 When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. 2 And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. 3 Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. 4 All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. 5 Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. 6 And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. 7 Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? 8 And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? 9 Parthians, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, 10 Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, 11 Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.' 12 All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' 13 But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.' 14 But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them: 'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. 15 Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. 16 No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 17 "In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. 18 Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. 19 And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky

mist. 20 The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. 21 Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Gospel Reading: John 7.37-52

37 On the last day of the festival, the great day, while Jesus was standing there, he cried out, 'Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, 38 and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, "Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water." '39 Now he said this about the Spirit, which believers in him were to receive; for as yet there was no Spirit, because Jesus was not yet glorified. 40 When they heard these words, some in the crowd said, 'This is really the prophet.' 41 Others said, 'This is the Messiah.' But some asked, 'Surely the Messiah does not come from Galilee, does he? 42 Has not the scripture said that the Messiah is descended from David and comes from Bethlehem, the village where David lived?' 43 So there was a division in the crowd because of him. 44 Some of them wanted to arrest him, but no one laid hands on him. 45 Then the temple police went back to the chief priests and Pharisees, who asked them, 'Why did you not arrest him?' 46 The police answered, 'Never has anyone spoken like this!' 47 Then the Pharisees replied, 'Surely you have not been deceived too, have you? 48 Has any one of the authorities or of the Pharisees believed in him? 49 But this crowd, which does not know the law—they are accursed.' 50 Nicodemus, who had gone to Jesus before, and who was one of them, asked, 51 'Our law does not judge people without first giving them a hearing to find out what they are doing, does it?' 52 They replied, 'Surely you are not also from Galilee, are you? Search and you will see that no prophet is to arise from Galilee.'

From Your Assistant Curate

We celebrate Pentecost Sunday and what a powerful display from God! We wear red to show this, symbolising the fire and sheer joy from the disciples when the Holy Spirit descends. Through the whole of human history, the indwelling of the Holy Spirit unique only to the Church – God's Spirit was never bestowed in the same magnitude nor across so many people as the age of the Church. So it is a great privilege for us for three reasons.

Firstly, the Holy Spirit empowers the Church to carry out God's will and be effective in doing it. Disciples making more disciples happens only after the Holy Spirit descends upon them, then uses their speech to transform people. In Acts 2 Peter's preaching means three thousand souls put their trust in the Lord Jesus (a scene that all clergy dream of)! Yet 50 days earlier, in the same town, the one that Peter proclaims was put to a horrible death. What makes the difference? It was not Peter's ability but rather the Spirit speaking through the message, changing peoples' hearts. So it is today – we proclaim Christ and bear this witness to others, but we cannot change hearts. Only God's Spirit can do that.

Secondly, the Holy Spirit transforms us into the character of the Lord Jesus. We aren't like him naturally but the Spirit is the Helper who prompts us, pricks our conscience, reminds us of biblical principles so that we continue to do good, even if it is difficult, costly, or counter-cultural.

Thirdly, the Holy Spirit means Christ is present with his people to comfort and direct us during this age. Christ himself says as much in the Gospel of Matthew, "And surely I am with you always to the very end of the age." (Mt 28:20).

So we can be encouraged and celebrate with great joy on Pentecost Sunday. Our responsibility is to present the gospel of our Lord Jesus to people, the Holy Spirit's responsibility is to change their hearts. Knowing clearly where our role ends and God's role begins means we won't despair or be proud. We also celebrate because we grow more Christ-like every day, putting old ways behind and pressing on to godliness. Lastly, in this unprecedented time we can rejoice for the Lord Jesus is with us. Through the Holy Spirit who dwells in us, he comforts, encourages, teaches, transforms.




RECESSIONAL TIS 409
