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# First Reading: Exodus 34.1-8

1 The Lord said to Moses, 'Cut two tablets of stone like the former ones, and I will write on the tablets the words that were on the former tablets, which you broke. 2 Be ready in the morning, and come up in the morning to Mount Sinai and present yourself there to me, on the top of the mountain. 3 No one shall come up with you, and do not let anyone be seen throughout all the mountain; and do not let flocks or herds graze in front of that mountain.' 4 So Moses cut two tablets of stone like the former ones; and he rose early in the morning and went up on Mount Sinai, as the Lord had commanded him, and took in his hand the two tablets of stone. 5 The Lord descended in the cloud and stood with him there, and proclaimed the name, 'The Lord .' 6 The Lord passed before him, and proclaimed, 'The Lord, the Lord, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, 7 keeping steadfast love for the thousandth generation, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin, yet by no means clearing the guilty, but visiting the iniquity of the parents upon the children and the children's children, to the third and the fourth generation.' 8 And Moses quickly bowed his head towards the earth, and worshipped.

## From Your Assistant Curate

Today is Trinity Sunday! Many people have argued that the Trinity is found nowhere in the Bible, and while the word itself is not in our Scriptures, the idea is certainly there. In fact, the Trinity was one of the earliest doctrines of the Church to be brought to an official Council – the Council of Nicaea in 325AD detailing the relationship within the Trinity, between the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The result of the Council was the formulation of what's now a cornerstone of the Christian faith, the Nicene Creed (fully completed in Constantinople 381AD), which we recite every week and has been recited each Sunday by Christians across the globe for over a thousand years.

With our brothers and sisters not only geographically, but historically, we stand in the same tradition when we recite this rich and beautiful creed, affirming what is attested to in God's Word, and therefore giving glory to him.

But reciting the Nicene Creed is just the beginning for us as Christians. For we do not have a merely intellectual faith, but one that bears fruit. It involves not just our head, but our heart and hands too.

When we affirm that the Lord our God is one we say no to other 'gods' – greed, ambition, violence, lust. When we affirm the Father is almighty, we have a deep trust in his sovereignty despite pandemics or the breakdown of societies. When we affirm that the Lord Jesus came down from heaven for us and for our salvation, we respond joyfully in worship. As Christ wins salvation for us at the cross we forgive others just as God forgives us. When we affirm the Holy Spirit is the Lord, the giver of life, we praise him for our regeneration into new life. We no longer live for ourselves but for others. We no longer indulge in anti-social behaviour or hold grudges, for we are a new creation, the old has gone and the new has come (2 Cor 5:17).

In celebrating Trinity Sunday, we remember our Lord God who is one being in three distinct persons. We rejoice that we stand in the Trinitarian tradition, and look forward to meeting brothers and sisters in Christ, the resurrection of the dead, who have gone before us in the same faith. Finally, in a tumultuous world we look forward to joining them and God in heaven, in the life of the world to come. Amen.
