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First Reading: Genesis 3.1-15

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?' 2 The woman said to the serpent, 'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; 3 but God said, "You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." 4 But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not die; 5 for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.' 6 So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. 7 Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves. 8 They heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. 9 But the Lord God called to the man, and said to him, 'Where are you?' 10 He said, 'I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself.' 11 He said, 'Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?' 12 The man said, 'The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate.' 13 Then the Lord God said to the woman, 'What is this that you have done?' The woman said, 'The serpent tricked me, and I ate.' 14 The Lord God said to the serpent, 'Because you have done this, cursed are you among all animals and among all wild creatures; upon your belly you shall go, and dust you shall eat all the days of your life. 15 I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike your head, and you will strike

Gospel Reading: Matthew 13.1-9,18-23

1 That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. 2 Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. 3 And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. 4 And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. 5 Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. 6 But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. 7 Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. 8 Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. 9 Let anyone with ears listen!' 18 'Hear then the parable of the sower. 19 When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. 20 As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; 21 yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. 22 As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. 23 But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'



From the Assistant/Curate

A book of two beginnings and one end

This week we begin our series in the book of Genesis, the first book of the Bible. Here we will learn about the beginning of human history under God's sovereignty which form the foundations of the Christian faith.

Genesis describes two significant 'beginnings', the first being the beginning of the world as God's orderly creation, and outlines his purposes particularly for humanity. Its first two chapters outline this beginning where creation is declared 'good' by God. But human rebellion results in broken relationships with God, between humans, and with creation. In the following chapters there is an escalation of this rebellion and brokenness culminating in chapter 11 where people overreach and desire to be equal with God by building the lofty Tower of Babel.

But the second beginning is the call of Abraham (Gen 12:1-3) where the narrative strikes a positive note and a new phase of God's work begins. The earlier section shows that God's blessings were intended to come through creation to humanity (Gen 1:28) but forfeited due to humanity's hubris. However, God mercifully calls Abraham in order to issue the promise that through one of his descendants, humanity in desperate need of redemption will be fully restored at some point in the future. Thus Genesis outlines the beginning of God's story in which his ultimate purpose for creation will be achieved.

While reading such a text with origins in a time and place so far from our own, we might question what relevance it has for us. I hope through our present circumstances we will see it actually shares more similarities than we realise, and that it is foundational to the Christian faith. For in the person and work of the Lord Jesus we now know precisely that God has achieved his purpose, opening up the way to deep and loving communion with him, each other, and creation.

With the present uncertainty that exists, we then of all people can begin to make sense of the world from a wide-angled perspective, trusting that through the ups and downs of history God is not surprised nor his purposes upended. Instead, we can step up and step out, helping others in the power of the Spirit, confident that in the message of Christ Jesus we all have something precious to offer the world. May we thus pray for all to find peace during this time by having deep relationship with the one through whom all of God's purposes are fulfilled – the Lord Jesus.
