First Reading: Genesis 6.9-22

9 These are the descendants of Noah. Noah was a righteous man, blameless in his generation; Noah walked with God. 10 And Noah had three sons, Shem, Ham, and Japheth.11 Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight, and the earth was filled with violence. 12 And God saw that the earth was corrupt; for all flesh had corrupted its ways upon the earth. 13 And God said to Noah, 'I have determined to make an end of all flesh, for the earth is filled with violence because of them; now I am going to destroy them along with the earth. 14 Make yourself an ark of cypress wood; make rooms in the ark, and cover it inside and out with pitch. 15 This is how you are to make it: the length of the ark three hundred cubits, its width fifty cubits, and its height thirty cubits. 16 Make a roof for the ark, and finish it to a cubit above; and put the door of the ark in its side; make it with lower, second, and third decks. 17 For my part, I am going to bring a flood of waters on the earth, to destroy from under heaven all flesh in which is the breath of life; everything that is on the earth shall die. 18 But I will establish my covenant with you; and you shall come into the ark, you, your sons, your wife, and your sons' wives with you. 19 And of every living thing, of all flesh, you shall bring two of every kind into the ark, to keep them alive with you; they shall be male and female. 20 Of the birds according to their kinds, and of the animals according to their kinds, of every creeping thing of the ground according to its kind, two of every kind shall come in to you, to keep them alive. 21 Also take with you every kind of food that is eaten, and store it up; and it shall serve as food for you and for them.' 22 Noah did this: he did all that God commanded him.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 13.24-30,36-43

24 He put before them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; 25 but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. 26 So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. 27 And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?" 28 He answered, "An enemy has done this." The slaves said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?" 29 But he replied, "No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. 30 Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn."

36 Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, 'Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.' 37 He answered, 'The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; 38 the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, 39 and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. 40 Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. 41 The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, 42 and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. 43 Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!

From the Assistant/Curate

God the Anchor

This week we continue our series in the book of Genesis. If you read through it you will notice themes and ideas that may be hard to envisage in our modern world. So here are some thoughts to consider as you read through Genesis this month and follow the series.

Firstly, there are many other ancient accounts of a large flood, including our own indigenous Australians in their Bundaba Flood Story. Some contend that the biblical account is just as fictional as are the other accounts. Others will argue that all others borrowed from the Genesis account. But the proliferation of a global flood account in ancient thinking shows that perhaps there was an actual flood which people of all cultures experienced and viewed from different perspectives.

In comparison to other ancient accounts though, Genesis emphasises God being the centre of the story more than humanity. For example, in the Ancient Near-Eastern accounts, the flood is the result of the gods controlling overpopulation or being irritated by human noise (e.g. Atrahasis Epic, Gilgamesh Epic). In contrast, Genesis captures God's sadness at the increase of human conflict, then God's faithfulness through the promise to Noah never to flood the earth to that scale again. So our God's character and care for relationships is in the spotlight.

While we might baulk at the violence and conflict in the Noahic chapters, sadly we see too often this kind of oppression and hatred among humanity today. To read the news can quickly turn from an innocent desire to be informed into a disbelief of what people can actually do to one another. However, the character of our benevolent God pierces through this darkness – where there once was no hope, we now can find it in the Lord Jesus. For in him we have the clearest picture of humanity as God intends, and the best expression of God's sacrificial love for humanity.

My hope is that despite the repetitious cycle of societal breakdown tossing us around like the waves, as Christians we can be anchored in the God who is in control and has been since the primeval days, as well as be inspired in his character such that we push against and through the tide of injustice and self-interest. In so doing, may we find peace amidst the storms of life, and that others may be drawn to our Lord, joining with us in praising God as his Spirit works within us.
