

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First Reading: Deuteronomy 18.15–18
15 The Lord your God will raise up for you a
prophet like me from among your own people;
you shall heed such a prophet. 16 This is what
you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on
the day of the assembly when you said: 'If I hear
the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever
again see this great fire, I will die.' 17 Then
the Lord replied to me: 'They are right in what
they have said. 18 I will raise up for them a
prophet like you from among their own people; I
will put my words in the mouth of the
prophet, who shall speak to them everything that

#### Gospel Reading: John 1.45-51

### The focal point of history

I've been reading a book by Ray Dalio, a renowned hedge fund manager, about financial economics and its relationship to geo-politics in modern history. In one captivating chapter, he notes that on average a world-power usually stays on top for around 100 years – the Dutch in the late 1700s, the British in the late 1800s, then the Americans in the late 1900s. Dalio thus identifies that world powers tend to come and go in cycles, though this has not just been a modern pattern, but throughout history – one can think of the Persian, Greek, and Roman empires two millennia ago.

In our Western context we generally think of time in reference to BC and AD (although that has been challenged recently), with Christ as the focal point of history. The Bible does not assert this explicitly, although it certainly points to this concept with the Old Testament and New Testament. So how did the Lord Jesus become the centre of this timeline? How did Christianity expand so rapidly to be the dominant religion even 2000 years later? There are four contextual reasons:

- 1. Politically: the ancient world became more of a global village with the Greek and Roman empires
- 2. Culturally: Greek and Roman heritage meant a common language and culture (cf. pax Romana)
- 3. Religiously: The dispersion of Jews enabled the flourishing of Christian ideas
- 4. Philosophically: Greek philosophy failed to adequately address morality and the big questions of life

Swiss theologian Emil Brunner puts it this way, "Plato and Alexander, Cicero and Julius Caesar must serve God, in order to prepare the way for Christ."

So we can see that God works throughout history setting a ripe and timely provenance in which his Christ breaks into the world, and the gospel rapidly spreads throughout the nations. It is precisely the good news about Christ's death and resurrection that proves he is the Lord not only to save (Jesus means 'he saves'), but also the Lord of history. In light of our context we may be overwhelmed with wild fluctuations whether financial, political, or medical. However we can always find solace in a benevolent Messiah whose death and resurrection enables salvation from sin and hope for the new creation. This qualifies him to be the focal point of history, and offers comfort as he is, has been, and always will be in control of that history too.


