

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First Reading: Acts 6.8-10, 7.54-60

8 Stephen, full of grace and power, did great wonders and signs among the people. 9 Then some of those who belonged to the synagogue of the Freedmen (as it was called), Cyrenians, Alexandrians, and others of those from Cilicia and Asia, stood up and argued with Stephen. 10 But they could not withstand the wisdom and the Spirit with which he spoke. 54 When they heard these things, they became enraged and ground their teeth at Stephen. 55 But filled with the Holy Spirit, he gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. 56 'Look,' he said, 'I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!' 57 But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. 58 Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. 59 While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' 60 Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.' When he had said this, he died.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 10.17-22

17 Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; 18 and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. 19 When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; 20 for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. 21 Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; 22 and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved.

St. John Vianney would often say:



From Your Vicar

Traditionally, the Feast of St Stephen is held on Boxing Day, but we hold the feast day on the alternative day in August. Let's face it, I don't think many would come to church for a service on Boxing Day, when it is used in our society as a family day to continue to celebrate Christmas or to go shopping!!

But it is a day when the Christian church has for centuries celebrated the life and death of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. Everything we know about Stephen comes from the Book of Acts. The name Stephen (Stephanos) is Greek, so we assume he was a Hellenistic, Greek – speaking Jew in Jerusalem. He is described in Acts 6:5 as a man "full of faith and the Holy Spirit....doing great wonders and signs among the people." He was chosen to oversee the distribution of food to poor widows, and he was also a preacher. His speech in Chapter 7 is the longest sermon recorded in Acts.

Most memorable are Stephen's words just before his martyrdom

Stephen, filled by the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven. He saw God's glory, with Jesus standing at the right hand of God, and he said, "Look! I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!" (Acts 7: 55 – 56)

As he was saying this, men began to stone him, laying their cloaks at the feet of a young man named Saul, a persecutor of Christians, who later became St Paul, the Apostle. Who knows what effect Stephen's words may have had on Paul's conversation.

It is no wonder that the early church gave St. Stephen the honour of a feast day on the first day after Christmas, a special season in the church year. If you remember the Christmas song of Good King Wenceslas, it says, "Good King Wenceslas looked out, On the Feast of Stephen when the snow lay round about, Deep and crisp and even.....And what does this have to do with Good King Wenceslas, other than he went out on the feast of Stephen? Good King Wenceslas saw a poor man trying to keep warm with very little fuel, and he had pity on him. Saying to his servant, 'Bring me bread and bring me wine, bring me pine logs hither," he brought the poor man to his house for dinner, becoming an example, in this carol, for all who have plenty and can give to those in need. It is a reminder to us, even today, that we are called to shout out to our society that we need to care for the vulnerable and needy, to show the world the injustices and corruption that are in our midst, those things that make other people's lives miserable and harsh. It was good to listen this afternoon to the Prime Minister and with those in the consultation from the indigenous people of Australia and formed a new Agreement called, Closing the Gap – a 10 year plan. Indigenous lives are important and they have special difficulties that need to be addressed, and so we pray that as this is a joint agreement that it will have a lasting change for the first people of this nation.

And so, all of this is the spirit of St Stephen's life and death – to give regardless of the cost.

1. Electronic sign

The sign has unfortunately stopped working due to some major "internal" issues. Parish Council has confirmed the great value of this sign and approved the repair of it.

2. Survey regarding "reopening"

Thank you to all those who completed this survey. Your answers and comments were very helpful for Parish Council when the time comes to reopen.

3. Mission Giving / Donation to Anglican Overseas Aid

Remaining Mission Allocation payments to be made (\$4,000). An extra payment of \$1000 was approved for St Peter's Anglican Church Eastern Hill Foundation who provides meals to those in need 7 days a week. This donation is as a "thank you" for the government's funding we are receiving during the pandemic. Council also approved a \$1000 donation to Anglican Overseas Aid in recognition of Refugee and Migrant Sunday which is at the end of August. As we did last year, we will request that this money go towards the Al Ahli Hospital Gaza project which aims to improve the lives of women with breast cancer in Gaza.
