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First Reading: Exodus 12.1-14

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: 2 This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. 3 Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. 4 If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. 5 Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. 6 You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. 7 They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. 8 They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. 9 Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. 10 You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. 11 This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. 12 For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgements: I am the Lord. 13 The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. 14 This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18.10-20

10 'Take care that you do not despise one of these little ones; for, I tell you, in heaven their angels continually see the face of my Father in heaven. 12 What do you think? If a shepherd has a hundred sheep, and one of them has gone astray, does he not leave the ninety-nine on the mountains and go in search of the one that went astray? 13 And if he finds it, truly I tell you, he rejoices over it more than over the ninety-nine that never went astray. 14 So it is not the will of your Father in heaven that one of these little ones should be lost. 15 'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. 16 But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. 17 If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. 18 Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. 19 Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. 20 For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'



From Your Vicar

"Nothing you can do that can't be done....it's easy. All you need is Love!" sang the Beatles in 1967 ("All You Need Is Love," by John Lennon and Paul McCartney [Capitol Records, Yellow Submarine, 1969]). Oh, if only it were! As Christians, we are called, above all to love: to love ourselves, to love our neighbours, our enemies, strangers, the world. Paul tells us that we owe nothing to each other but love. And yet, we find it hard to love ourselves because we live in a culture that values certain characteristics – beauty, power, strength, intelligence, wealth – and if we don't have them we re aware only of what we lack, and if we do, we aren't sure if we are appreciated for who we really are, or just for the externals. We find it difficult to love our neighbours because the pain of rejection is enough to keep us from trying. We cannot imagine loving our enemies because, if we did, they wouldn't be our enemies anymore (which perhaps is the point). Loving strangers is fine as long as we don't have to do it up close and personal, and few of us have any idea what loving the world even looks like. I will talk about the parable of the lost sheep in a moment, but after the parable of the lost sheep Matthew goes on to talk about a method of restoring relationships. While the method of trying to restore a broken relationship appears easy, it is much more complex when we get into it. Jesus was about relationships. And if we remember his life and ministry we remember that he was also about reaching out to the people on the margins. It says, 'that if the person does not listen to the community, treat that person like a gentile and a tax collector". But while we do know that Jesus said that if people do not listen to the gospel, leave that place and brush the dust from your feet (Luke 10:11), Jesus is seen to seek those out with whom he has a relationship to bring them even closer....he entered the home and ate with sinners and tax collectors." Jesus continually sought to maintain a relationship. Moving toward someone who has hurt us or wounded us it totally counter-intuitive. Perhaps when Jesus calls us to love and forgive, the reason he doesn't give us a timetable is that he recognizes that some situations are easier to cope with than others. But I do want to say a little something about the beautiful parable of the lost sheep.....

At the beginning of the gospel reading we have the parable of the lost sheep where the shepherd makes every effort to find the lost one and bring it back to the fold. We see in Matthew that Jesus loves each one of us so much we would go to such lengths to find that one lost sheep and the parable shows the joy of the Master when the lost one returns.

As many of you know that I was brought up on a sheep (grazing) property in the Western District. And so, the pastoral images of the bible really resonate with me as I can still see my Father echoing these images. Dad used to have a little book in which he had the name of each paddock and the number of sheep in each paddock listed.....he didn't have names for the sheep though!! He would regularly go around his flocks and if any had died he would change the number in his book. When it came time to move the flock to another paddock, he would count the sheep through the gate (he could count 5 sheep at a time running and jumping through the gate). At the end of the transfer he would check the number with his tally in his book, and if it was out he would get either on the tractor or the quad bike and ride around the paddock to find that lost sheep and bring it to the flock in their new paddock. Dad loved his sheep and was always happy to find the lost one.

How much more the Lord loves each one of us even when we have straved and left his side. We will gather
