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First Reading: Exodus 14.19-31

19 The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. 20 It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night. 21 Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. 22 The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. 23 The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. 24 At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. 25 He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, 'Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt.' 26 Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers.' 27 So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. 28 The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea: not one of them remained. 29 But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. 30 Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Equptians dead on the seashore. 31 Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18.21-35

21 Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' 22 Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. 23 'For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. 24 When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; 25 and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. 26 So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything." 27 And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. 28 But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow-slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, "Pay what you owe." 29 Then his fellow-slave fell down and pleaded with him, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you." 30 But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he should pay the debt. 31 When his fellow-slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. 32 Then his lord summoned him and said to him, "You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. 33 Should you not have had mercy on your fellow-slave, as I had mercy on you?" 34 And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he should pay his entire debt. 35 So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.'

From Your Assistant/Curate

Many have found this time a period of heightened emotions and you may know or have experienced yourself relationships sadly breaking down. Our theme this Sunday is 'forgiveness' so this is apt as we manage our way through the lockdown.

One of my favourite books of the Bible is Proverbs, and one particular proverb matches our theme: Proverbs 24:29 "Do not say, "I will do to others as they have done to me; I will pay them back for what they have done."


This proverb shows us the ideology behind resentment. It can feel 'natural' to want payback when we are wronged. It can be a repeated thought pattern. But here, Proverbs tells us explicitly to refuse the thought, 'do not say'. Forgiveness however, is a commitment not to pay someone back, but to bear the cost ourselves.

The desire for vengeance doesn't just harm another person, but harms us too. In our Genesis series we briefly looked at Adam and Eve's son, Cain whose sinful resentment mastered him (Genesis 4:6-7). If someone wrongs us, we may hope for that person to be unhappy. We may graduate to saying and doing things to hurt them and those around them. This is what consumes Cain – the evil done to us now begins to take hold of and starts to shape us.

We ought to beware of subtle ways we try and extract this payback. Let us not drag the past up over and over. Let us not be more demanding and controlling of the person who has wronged us, all because we feel they owe us. Let us refuse to hint or gossip to diminish them in others' eyes under the guise of 'warning' people or getting personal support. Let us not continue to replay these memories in our imagination, otherwise the sense of loss and hurt will continue to be fresh and cause us to be hostile and feel overly virtuous.

By forgiving, by bearing the cost of sin against us, we walk the path of our master (Colossians 3:13). To forgive is to refuse to hold people liable for what they do to us but instead leave it to God, for it is his job not ours (Romans 12:19). If the Lord Jesus died to forgive us of an infinite debt to him, how can we not forgive the wrongdoer their finite debt to us?
