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First Reading: Exodus 32.1-14

1 When the people saw that Moses delayed to come down from the mountain, the people gathered around Aaron and said to him, 'Come, make gods for us, who shall go before us; as for this Moses, the man who brought us up out of the land of Egypt, we do not know what has become of him.' 2 Aaron said to them, 'Take off the gold rings that are on the ears of your wives, your sons, and your daughters, and bring them to me.' 3 So all the people took off the gold rings from their ears, and brought them to Aaron. 4 He took the gold from them, formed it in a mould, and cast an image of a calf; and they said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land Egypt!' 5 When Aaron saw this, he built an altar before it; and Aaron made proclamation and said, 'Tomorrow shall be a festival to the Lord .' 6 They rose early the next day, and offered burnt-offerings and brought sacrifices of well-being; and the people sat down to eat and drink, and rose up to revel. 7 The Lord said to Moses, 'Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; 8 they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshipped it and sacrificed to it, and said, "These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!" ' 9 The Lord said to Moses, 'I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. 10 Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation.' 11 But Moses implored the Lord his God, and said, 'O Lord, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? 12 Why should the Egyptians say, "It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth"? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. 13 Remember

Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, "I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants, and they shall inherit it for ever." '14 And the Lord changed his mind about the disaster that he planned to bring on his people.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 22.1-14

1 Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: 2 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. 3 He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. 4 Again he sent other slaves, saying, "Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet." 5 But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, 6 while the rest seized his slaves, maltreated them, and killed them. 7 The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. 8 Then he said to his slaves, "The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. 9 Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet." 10 Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests. 11 'But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, 12 and he said to him, "Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?" And he was speechless. 13 Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." 14 For many are called, but few are chosen.'

From Your Assistant Curate

The controversy between the Lord Jesus and the Jewish leaders is described in chapters 21-23 of Matthew's Gospel. Christ arrives in Jerusalem, at the doorstep of 'the establishment' of his day. He is met with provocation and perceived by the religious leaders as a disturber of the peace. Hence these chapters describe the beginning of our Lord's journey to the cross.

It's within these chapters that our Lord recounts three parables which are distinct from one another, yet help interpret one another. All are clearly directed at the religious leaders and concerned with who is really acceptable to God. The Lord Jesus suggests that the true Israel is now to be found in himself and in those who follow him.

What issue did Christ have with the religious leaders? He explains in his Sermon on the Mount earlier in Matthew's Gospel. Here, Christ reissues the book of Proverbs, taking the Ten Commandments and applies them to the practical matters of daily life - right living brings blessedness, flourishing, shalom. In particular, Christ identifies that the meek, the humble, the lowly will inherit the earth.

While none of us are perfectly like this, we can still be blessed and inherit the earth through Christ. For he becomes 'gentle' riding on a colt than a warhorse (Matthew 21:5). He is like a lamb being led to the slaughter but did not open his mouth (Isaiah 53:7). But he rescues us through his perfect meekness. If we believe in him, we receive justification by faith (Romans 3:23-24) and we inherit a new heaven and new earth (Romans 8:18-21).

So Christ consistently pushes against the proud and powerful of his day. He teaches that the way up is down, to be glorified is to be humble. This seems foolish to the world but is wise to God for this is how God comes to be with us, Immanuel. Let us remember that in God's big picture it is the meek who in the end will be exalted. Let us learn the lesson from Christ's parables not to regress into high-brow comfort like the religious leaders. Instead let us humbly serve others as he did. In so doing we properly represent Christ as we shine the hope of the gospel into a world that so desperately needs it.
