
THE TREE WITH A SPIDER'S WEB


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First Reading: Ezekiel 34.11-16,20-24

11 For thus says the Lord God : I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. 12 As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. 13 I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. 14 I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. 15 I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God . 16 I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice. 20 Therefore, thus says the Lord God to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. 21 Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, 22 I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep. 23 I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. 24 And I, the Lord, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the Lord, have spoken.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 25: 31-46

31 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. 32 All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, 33 and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. 34 Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; 35 for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, 36 I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." 37 Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? 38 And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? 39 And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" 40 And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." 41 Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; 42 for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, 43 I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." 44 Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" 45 Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." 46 And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'



From Your Vicar

We celebrate Christ the King this Sunday, the last Sunday of the Christian calendar, before Advent. This Feast, a clear reminder of Christ's reign, was instituted as a response to the growing influence of secularism and 'people power' as 'the State' attempted to relegate the Church.

This movement, particularly across Europe in the early 1900s led to dictatorships which triggered the two World Wars. It gave way to leadership that considered world domination at the expense of the lives of their own citizens. So we see that any country, organisation, or department is in disarray and is fruitless unless a good head is appointed. In contrast, under worthy management everything works seamlessly and holds together – people are productive, morale increases and they thrive as a result. This is the same, whether a country under a sound government or a footy club under a good coach. Leadership heals what is broken by uniting what was fragmented.

We are told in St Paul's letter to the Colossians that in King Jesus, "...all things were created...He is before all things and in him all things hold together." (Col 1:15-17). In the world's creation under his divine supervision, all was paradise. But due to human rebellion this was disrupted such that what we have now is disorder and death. But God offers us the hope he has always held out to us – his Christ, dying on the cross, rising to new life, and now ruling at his right hand in heaven. Reigning. Sovereign. In control. God's King is the one who is promised to return and heal the world completely.

In a year which has up-ended our plans, predictions, and preparations, let us not forget who is really in control. Whatever tumult demands authority and our attention, we need not turn aside from our faithful God. Let us remember that as King, Christ is the true authority. Our fractured and disrupted world needs Christ's benevolent leadership. For in him we find peace with God, and peace with others. May we throw off anything that hinders and persevere as we keep turning our eyes upon King Jesus. All else will grow 'strangely dim' in the light of His glory and grace.



Carol Service

I am planning to hold a shortened Carol Service on Sunday 6th December at 5pm in the Peace Court at Church. At this stage our measurements allow for 50 people but please do not ring to book in yet. I am just giving you some advance notice to put it in your diary and we are hoping that we may be able to live stream it as well.

Christmas Services

<u>At this stage</u> and subject to change, we are planning for a Christmas Eve (24th) 5pm service, again about 50 people and our focus will be for families with children to be able to come first. Again we are hoping to live stream this. In the past this service has been the largest of all the Christmas services with between 150-180 people so you can see our numbers will have to be greatly reduced.

<u>Midnight Mass 11pm</u>. At this stage again only 20 people in 2 groups of 10 separated by 5 metres. Again this will have to be a scaled back service without all the procession that we usually have because everyone will be too close. This is still in the planning process and we hope this service will be live streamed.

Christmas Day (25th) 9am. Again at this stage 20 people in 2 groups of 10 separated by 5 metres but I don't expect this service will be live streamed.

I know you are all anxious and wanting to know but this is the best I can do at this stage. You might like to give some extra prayer about nice weather for our outside services. **Please do not ring Dianne to book in for any of these Christmas services yet.**
