

First Reading: 2 Peter 3: 8-15a

Gospel Reading: Mark 1: 1-8

1 The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. 2 As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, 'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; 3 the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight" ', 4 John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. 5 And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. 6 Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. 7 He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. 8 I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.'

From Your Vicar

The word Advent comes from the Latin *adventium* meaning "to come". Within the Church it refers to the coming of Christ, both as the Child of Mary and as Judge at the end of time. For this reason it is the name we give to the four week season to prepare for Christmas.

Advent has its own music, carols (as distinct from Christmas carols), themes, and traditions (like the Advent wreath). What makes the keeping of Advent so difficult is the commercial world starts Christmas in October and finishes on December 24th. The Church by contrast, keeps Advent up till December 24, and then Christmas is celebrated until January 6. This makes everything a bit schizophrenic, however, there is value in keeping the integrity of Advent.

Advent is the context and setting for us to understand the identity of the Child of Bethlehem. He is more than the cute Christmas card figure....He is the Almighty Judge proclaimed by John the Baptist (Second and Third Sunday of Advent). He is the goal and fulfilment of human history (First Sunday of Advent) who has entered into human history through the Most Hold God-Bearer, Mary of Nazareth. Christ who is the Child of Mary two thousand years ago, and who will come as Universal Judge at the end of time is also Brother, Lord, Lover and Friend who makes His adventium TODAY in the Eucharist – who enters into our souls in Christmas IS important, so important that we need to prepare for it.


