First Reading: 2 Kings 2.1-12

Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. 2 Elijah said to Elisha, 'Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as Bethel.' But Elisha said. the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.' So they went down to Bethel. 3 The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, 'Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?' And he said, 'Yes, I know; keep silent.' 4 Elijah said to him, 'Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho.' But he said, 'As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.' So they came to Jericho. 5 The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, 'Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?' And he answered, 'Yes, I know; be silent.' 6 Then Elijah said to him, 'Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan.' But he said, 'As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.' So the two of them went on. 7 Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. 8 Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. 9 When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, 'Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you.' Elisha said, 'Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit.' 10 He responded, 'You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not.' 11 As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. 12 Elisha kept watching and crying out, 'Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!' But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4: 3 – 12 If our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. 4 In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers,

to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. 5 For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. 6 For it is the God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness', who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. 7 But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. 8 We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; 9 persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; 10 always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. 11 For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh. 12 So death is at work in us, but life in you.

Gospel Reading: Mark 9: 2 - 9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, 3 and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. 4 And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. 5 Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' 6 He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. 7 Then cloud а overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, 'This is my Beloved; listen to him!' 8 Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus. 9 As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

From Your Assistant Curate

Over the summer I've noticed a common theme in conversations – the interesting, unprecedented, difficult, year that was 2020. It was not an easy year for most. There is also an uncertainty about what 2021 will hold. It's as if we mimic the psalmist who cries, "I lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come?" (Ps 121:1)

I think it is a blessing then to be reminded of God's truth on this feast of the Transfiguration. For in this pericope we resonate with Peter, James, and John who were called to follow our Lord Jesus up the mountain. There are strong echoes of the fulfilment of the Old Testament – just as Moses met God in the burning bush on a mountain, the apostles see Christ in resplendent glory. Just as God declares his divinity, "I am" to Moses through speech, the Father speaks and declares Christ's divinity as his 'beloved son'.

Yet the passage is brief. They didn't stay on the mountain, the cloud vanished, and the disciples follow our Lord back down the mountain, only to see his death and execution shortly after.

We too may remember the excitement of knowing God, feeling and experiencing vibrant faith which knows no bounds. Yet somewhere along the way, life becomes complicated and we end up a bit worse for wear. Can you imagine the apostles witnessing the crucifixion of the Lord? They too would've despaired and wondered, "What happened to the glorious Christ we saw up on the mountain?"

In the midst of trials, I want to encourage you to recall the pattern the apostles experience journeying with Christ. The gospels don't end at Christ's death, he doesn't stay in the tomb. Rather, our Lord is raised to life and ascends to heaven where he now reigns. He will return in glory. Christ does lay it bare, not sugar coating it for those who want to follow him – "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me." (Luke 9:23). So we ought not to be surprised when life becomes messy and recognise this is the pattern for his disciples. But may we be strengthened through the rigours of life, remembering that the pattern ends with our Lord in glory, sovereignly caring for his people.
